THE CORNER

On March 7th, Nora Church gathered for worship and reflected on ministry within the congregation under the theme—The Future of Nora: Mission and Ministry. Our reflections again were guided by Rev. Mark Yackel-Juleen who is assisting us in a process of reflection and visioning regarding the future of our congregation

Rev. Yackel-Juleen began by presenting some statistical trends related to membership and stewardship. By taking the trends of the last 8 years and projecting them out ten years into the future, we get a picture of what to expect in the year 2013. Those figures are in the table below.

It was noted that there has been a steady decline in adult membership in recent years, which includes the number of members financially supporting the congregation. At the same time there has been a steady increase in financial support per pledge. However, this increase does not fully compensate for the decrease in giving members and the inflation of expenses. Thus, by 2013, expenses will exceed operating pledges by about 73% and that is based on the very conservative figure of only 3.8% expense

growth over the last 8 years. Looking at a more realistic projection of 3% annually, expenses will exceed operating pledges by more than \$47,000. There are basically three ways to counter that trend—grow in membership, grow more in financial support, and or decrease expenses. Based on a quick (and unscientific tally) those present in worship could think of 104 people that they knew who were not active in another congregation and could be invited.

Rev. Yackel-Juleen then engaged the congregation in discussion around two questions. The first was “In terms of ministry (tending to the well-being – spirituality, physically, emotionally, intellectually – of its members and the community at large) what assets and capacities does Nora possess?”

Many of the responses related to the fact that Nora is a congregation where different ideas about spirituality are accepted and not judged. People are encouraged to “think outside the box.” The beauty of the location was also emphasized. It was also underscored that the dedicated membership was a wonderful asset. Many are long-standing members, yet they are open and hospitable to newcomers. The second question was “What assets and capacities would you like to see Nora develop?” A prominent response to this question was the need to do more outreach and service projects in the community. There was also strong interest in having a more active youth program. There was a desire to fellowship “play together” more. There was also a concern for more spiritual depth in the context of the worship. A complete list of the responses is available at the church for those who would like it. Everyone is encouraged to continue to reflect on these questions individually and in conversation with other members of Nora.
