

### VIEW FROM THE HILL



Martin Luther King, Jr. would have been 78 years old had he lived until his next birthday, January 15. He was 39 when he was shot on a Memphis motel balcony in April 1968. He was there to support a strike by that city's sanitation workers.

I think of King in much the same way I think of the Hebrew prophets and, to a large degree, Jesus, too: prophet. So about this time of year I reread King's "Letter From a Birmingham Jail", that scathing indictment

of the white, liberal clergy that remained quiet as the remnants of the Old South reacted with clubs and water cannons and tear gas in defense of their racism. That letter, composed on the margins of newspapers, reminds us that slavery has a shelf life that will never expire. It reminds us that race and class are bound together. And it reminds us that ecumenical and interfaith cooperation are essential to justice work.

Come January 14 we'll borrow the UCC (New Ulm) kitchen and sanctuary to host another spaghetti supper, this time featuring a lecture by Dr. Hamed Sallam, who teaches at Minnesota State University, Mankato. (Dr. Sallam will speak to us about Muslim-Christian dialogue.) The proceeds of that benefit will go to support an orphanage and burn unit for children in Iraq.

So what does that fundraiser have to do with Dr. King? Everything. The King who worked to dismantle racism was also the King who bitterly opposed the Vietnam War. The King who protested that war was the same King who decried poverty. And the King who decried poverty was the same King who turned to a Hindu, Gandhi, to be schooled in nonviolence.

Can we doubt that Martin Luther King, Jr., had he survived, would be doing anything other than protesting a war rife with religious division? A war begun by his own country? Would he not be heartened by even our meager attempts to do something about the carnage our presence has created in Iraq?

Please come join us on January 14, and if you can't, we'll appreciate your contribution on behalf of the innocent children caught in the crossfire of yet another war. That's not a bad way to mark the birth of prophet.

The Social Justice Committee is gearing up for our January Martin Luther King fundraiser for the children of Iraq. You may remember that we had a successful event last year raising over \$1000. Lee Schmidt was able to forward on the orphanage portion of those monies near where he is stationed in Iraq. We're looking forward to photos in the near future that illustrate that endeavor. This event was supported very well by you as a congregation last year as well as a number of others from the community and so we decided a repeat was a good next step this year. Don, along with the UCC pastor, Hank Campbell, have made arrangements for our guest speaker, Dr. Shallom. Now what is needed are your efforts and "manpower" to prepare, clean up and serve the spaghetti dinner as well as do preevent sales of the enclosed tickets. We are hopeful that if we all work together we can have another great evening. So, mark January 14th on your calendars. Call one of the Social Justice committee members to volunteer. Sign up on the clipboard which will be available at the first service in January, January 7th.

Nora once again helped to distribute the food in St. James for the Food for All project. We took our quarterly Saturday, December 9th, and helped with this outreach to those in need of food. Thanks to those who volunteered that day! What a great opportunity for our community brothers and sisters in need to take home items which they can use to provide meals to themselves and their families.

### **BOARD NOTES**

The Nora Church Board of Trustees accepted with regret the resignation of board members Tarrie Swenstad and Charles Anderson and welcomed new member Scott Schmiesing. The board stressed the need for long-range planning to decide what it wants the church to look like in several years and work purposefully to achieve those goals.

The board also received reports from various committees outlining ideas to make the church more attractive to visitors.

The board set a timeline for the budget process. Committees are being urged to prepare a budget request for the next church year by Sunday, February 14 so the board can begin putting together a budget at its February meeting. Doug Anderson has agreed to head the Pledge Committee. The board authorized purchasing a new computer for the office. The current one was damaged by a lightning strike and has not been working up to speed.

To keep the congregation informed about board actions, the minutes of the previous month's meeting are posted on the foyer bulletin board. Older minutes are filed and available in a notebook which is kept on the book cart in the Iverson Room.

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It's the start of a New Year and with that time for a look back at the past year at Nora.

There were little physical changes like removing one pew to provide better access to the side aisle. There were bigger ones like new lights in the sanctuary, the painting of fellowship hall, and the painting of the church itself.

There were more personal changes with new friends joining and the lost of old friends. More people were willing to teach at Sunday School or to serve on committees. The Coming of Age class graduated and Soulful Sundown was started in New Ulm.

The biggest event of course was the 125th Anniversary of Nora's founding. A wonderful day in August followed in November by another great

evening celebrating our past at the Union Hall. Now we must look to the future. One item we need to be aware of is how we can better use technology to do the work of Nora. But there are probably other ideas out there too to consider. So, thanks to the Committee on Ministry, look for an idea box that will be placed in the lobby. If you have an idea or just a thought about something concerning Nora just slip it in the box if that's what's most comfortable for you. There will be other changes but of course in the coming year but the caring, giving hearts of Nora won't change. That is one constant we can depend on.

At GA in St. Louis, Peacemaking was the first CSAI (Congregational Social Action Issue) under the new system adopted there. By March 1st, 2007, comments are due. (a comment form is available as are other parts of this packet) Let Brenda Wiger know if you'd like to review it. We also have a chart overview of the new system, the draft Statement of Conscience(DSOC), as well as the text of the draft SOC on Moral Values for a Pluralistic Society. 
#### **DON'S SCHEDULE**
