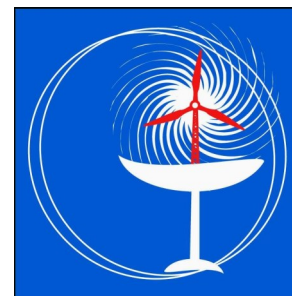

A VIEW FROM THE HILL

As this winter's fierce winds blow February into March, Black History Month 2015 morphs into Women's History Month 2015. You've probably seen the educational spots between commercials on television—highlighting important figures and moments in Black History and Women's History. You may have wondered or heard others wonder, why.

Why in 2015 do we still have Black History Month? Why in 2015 do we still have Women's History Month? And why, some folks even grumble, isn't there a White History Month or a Men's History Month? The answer should be as obvious as it is disheartening. Labeled so or not, every month is Men's History Month and every month is White History Month.

From incarceration rates to wage gaps, from academic achievement gaps to opportunities and recognition for behind the camera work (directing and producing) in television and movies, from corporate glass ceilings to medical and pharmaceutical research and testing—and hundreds of other areas of modern life just as varied—white folks and men and, it must be said, especially white men, enjoy advantages (often life-saving advantages) that women and people of color are denied. The root causes of these gaps are deeply entrenched in our society, complex and interwoven and well beyond the scope of this column, but one is worth noting:

Allowing the experiences and contributions of women to be overlooked, ignored, dismissed or forgotten creates conditions under which it becomes easy to believe that men deserve more money than women with identical education, qualifications and work experience for the same job. Allowing the experiences and contributions of people of color to be overlooked, ignored, dismissed or forgotten creates conditions under which it becomes easy to believe that imposing harsher sentences on black or Hispanic offenders than white offenders for the same crime is somehow just. But believing it doesn't make it so.

Maybe in 2020 or 2115 our history texts and entertainment award ceremonies and governmental funding and sentencing patterns and hiring and salary data will all demonstrate that we've finally reached such a degree of racial and gender justice and equity that Black History Month and Women's History Month are obsolete or at worst quaint and vintage concepts. Maybe.

But in 2015, paying extra attention to Black History and Women's History, stating loudly, often and for the record that Black Lives Matter, acknowledging the shameful, painful reality that Yes All Women have cause to fear sexual violence, and bold statements of similar, too often hidden truths—in 2015, all these are still necessary means of seeking to transform the world we know into the world we would give to our children and grandchildren.

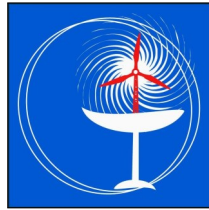

Palm Sunday is found:

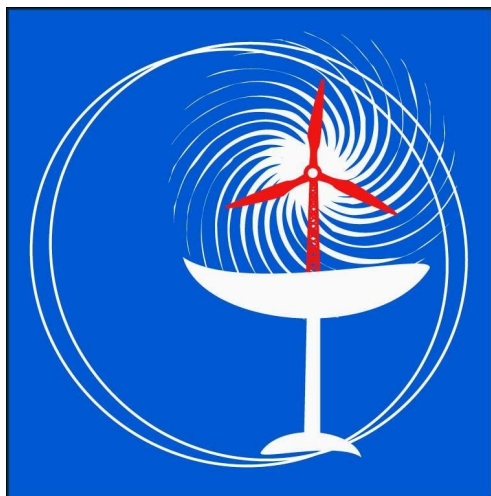
whenever we are serving a noble and unpopular cause with selfless devotion, holding to the ideals of truth and justice;
