SARAH'S CORNER

It is hard to believe it is time to begin another church year. Jerry and I had a very nice summer. First of all, we bought a house in Milwaukee, so we really will be moving January 1! Then we drove our motorhome to visit our son and grandchildren in Pennsylvania,

attended two square dance camping conventions, and stopped at various points of interest along the way. One stop was at Niagara Falls - the Canadian side, which we had not seen before. It was the high point of our vacation!

We arrived at the campground late afternoon, ate a quick supper, and took a shuttle bus to the falls. It was a perfect day - warm but not hot, clear and sunny with a few wispy clouds floating over the falls. It was that time of early evening when everything seems more intense than other times; the whites glisten and the colors bore into your soul. The falls were gorgeous! We walked leisurely along the promenade between the two sets of falls, stopping often to drink in the view and absorb the wonder of it all. We lingered as dusk fell, and then darkness, when the lights were turned on the water and the falls took on an ethereal look. We waited and watched as a full moon came up over the falls, and then fireworks played in the sky between the two. It was heaven on earth.

In the last few years, we have traveled quite a bit in Europe, where we (like everyone else) visit many old churches and cathedrals, marveling at the architecture, the lovely stained glass windows, the statues and the opulence. Each seems grander than the last. Each has a kind of "aura" that leaves one feeling humble and moved. You know these are sacred spaces; you feel they represent religion at its finest.

Yet, standing there before the falls and the full moon, I felt more awe and wonder and peace and inspiration than in any church. I knew I was, indeed, in the presence of something extraordinary, experiencing the marvelous beauty and order of the universe. I remembered a quote from someone long forgotten, who said that his God was too large to be contained in a mere church, or in any book, or even in one religion. His God was so large it took up the whole universe, and everyone in it. That is exactly how I felt standing there, looking at the falls.

I was not alone, of course. There were hundreds of other people from all over the world. East Indian women in bright saris and men with turbans; Arab women dressed in lovely silk pants and tunics, with filmy scarves around their heads, and some in full burkas with only slits to look out to see the world; South American families with flowered and decorated clothing; Africans in colorful native costumes. It was a melange of color and texture. Every language imaginable was being spoken. Every world religion was represented.

But all of us - every person there - had the same emotional and spiritual experience as we gazed at the falls while the evening closed in around us. It was obvious that the greatness of the universe included us all, no matter what our religion, nationality, or appearance. God was, indeed, larger than any single church, book, or religion. The same feeling of awe was present in every heart, visible in every eye.

I thought, as I stood there, how wonderful it would be if there were some way to transport this feeling we all shared into the halls of governments throughout the world, and into the hearts of the policy makers. It gave me some hope that, perhaps, there might be some way that we could put aside our differences and share common experiences and goals. I hoped that we could realize that individual religions and nationalities really do not matter much in this world when people come together in a sacred place and share the awesome power of nature. If only we could carry that feeling back to our respective countries and churches and use it as a basis for unity.

Ah well, one can always hope. I will always remember that wondrous night at Niagara Falls, and try to use it as a background against which I pursue my dreams and carry out my everyday life. It will ever remain as an image of that for which we strive, and a metaphor for life as it ought to be.

Meanwhile, we enter into another year together, pursuing our individual and collective dreams, working to try to make them come true. Welcome back!
