Growth. The Board and I are working together to develop and carry out new ways to better promote our liberal religious message, trusting that the message itself (as lived by this warmhearted congregation) will be attractive to those seeking an alternative to orthodoxy. No gimmicks, just new thinking about how to better live out our mission of freedom, community and justice.

With the help of Sheldon Rieke and our Board, T've initiated three new ideas to enhance our ministry. First, on October 19 we'll be starting a bimonthly service at John and Anne Makepeace's Rhein River Arts Center, in New Ulm. (After the first date we'll meet on the first and third Thursdays of each month, at 7:00 P.M.) The vision is that of an interactive, experiential, arts-centered program. It will involve music, meditation, poetry and sharing. My hope is that the service will evolve to suit those who attend. The goal is to bring a bit of Nora to New Ulm.

Second, those of you who attended the service on September 17 were introduced to Cris Brizuela, our ministerial intern. After being contacted by United Theological Seminary (New Brighton, MN) I worked with our board to explore hosting Cris for a part-time, 9-month internship. She'll be gaining experience in the areas of preaching, pastoral care, administration and religious education. Be sure to introduce yourself to Cris. She's an impressive person and on her way to becoming an excellent UU minister.

Third, with the support of the Program Committee, I'll be sharing the pulpit with area folk who can enhance our mission by speaking to us about their work on behalf of others. Marlys Zetah will speak to us about her experience as a volunteer assisting in the Hurricane Katrina cleanup. Jill Kramer will relate to us her work with the marginalized of the Brown County. And Tracie Welton will be with us to share about environmentalism.

So, we're gearing up to grow by increasing our presence in New Ulm, enhancing our level of ministry as we help educate a budding minister and educating ourselves about the needs of others. I'm grateful for your support as we find new ways to keep Nora Church alive and well.


MAILBOXES

BOARD'S REPORT

The Board had a training session on September 1st to learn more about board leadership and membership. An emergency board meeting was also called to deal with the possibility of Nora having a seminary intern. We were able to deal with the concern in a timely matter because of by-law changes that you voted in last June. If we had been under the old rules, we would not have been able to meet until after the deci-

sion needed to be made, and would have missed out on a wonderful opportunity. Thank you for supporting that change in the by-laws.

The regular board meeting on September 13th was fairly routine. The only item of note was the hard work put in by Julie Peck as she works to arrange a special preview of the new movie "Conversations with God" at Nora. Based on the best selling book of the same name, this movie would draw many to Nora. More details will be forthcoming as soon as they are known.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

The Social Justice committee is off to an exciting church year! We fulfilled Nora's commitment to provide people resources at the St. James Food for All event which took place on September 9th. You probably remember that as a church community we agreed to help with this the 2nd Sat. for four different months. So church members next opportunity to support this activity with their people resources will be in Dec. on the 9th as well. The group from St. James continue to do a remarkable job of purchasing/ pursuing donations of foods which are then organized and over 100 families come on the Saturday and receive a grocery bag of food for which they can make a free will donation as they are able. This time we gave out sandwich meats, rice, jello, cereal, bread products, etc. Thanks to Carol and Allen Chambard who joined SJ committee members that day.

Our other SJ "event" so far this church happened on September 10th. that Sunday we welcomed Becky Marquez to the pulpit from the Cottonwood River Integration Collaborative. She talked about her work which involves a model of assessing not only where people are in terms of understanding other cultures but also where they think they are, or want to be. The effort seeks to increase intercultural integration and prepare individuals for positive interactions with other cultures in a global environment. She pointed out to us that there are areas that fall within this manv "understanding" process. It could be issues around age discrimination, sexual orientation, economics, abledness, etc.

She will be returning to Nora the first Sundays in both November and December to continue with workshops following the potlucks on those respective days. On the first Sunday she will have the survey available for individual church members to complete. They take about 45 minutes to complete and so we will make child care arrangements for that time. Becky told us that the survey is appropriate for ages from high

school on up so we are hoping this can be a multi-generational event as well! The December Sunday Becky will return with the results of the survey in a congregational sort of format or sorting and will share those results. She will help us begin to look as a church community at how we might like to use that information as we move forward. The cost of individual surveys are \$10 a piece. We hope we have a comprehensive grouping of survey participants, so please plan to join us. If anyone has questions please feel free to contact one of the SJ committee members. Copies of her sermon are available in the church foyer.

Our next planning meeting for SJ is set for September 27th at 7 p.m. at the Wigers at 408 South Highland if you'd like to join us.
