VIEW FROM THE HILL

The fellow on the other end of the line wanted to know if I was "the one who was trying to get the

school levy passed." All it took was my "Yes" for him to launch into a diatribe about "you people" that just want to raise taxes without thinking about the impact for those who live on a fixed income. When I asked to whom I was speaking, he gave me his name, then continued to berate me until I wished him a good day and hung up.

Not one to be deterred by a severed phone connection, the man called back. I didn't pick up. So he left a message suggesting that if I can't take the heat I should get out of the kitchen. His final advice: "In other words, keep your nose in your own church!"

Public education is a lightning rod in these parts, even in our own congregation. After some initial thoughts about asking permission to list Nora Church among the supporting institutions for the upcoming TSD 88 referendum, it became clear that many were not comfortable with such an endorsement. Understood.

Stepping back from what is for me a critical local issue (public education), the more important question has to do with our engagement with our greater "parish": How are we to interface with the various communities around us? Put differently, for what do we want to be known?

Some of our more orthodox friends tell us that we're a bunch of agnostics with a Sunday morning habit. Not true. The heard us referred to as heretics. Probably so. And, in an age in which the word liberal has become code for something approaching the Antichrist, The met some folks who fairly spit when describing us with the "L Word".

We know better than to let others define us, but that doesn't answer the question about how we, ourselves, choose to be known. Are we the church that insists on reason in religion? Are we the church that respects other traditions, yet respectfully disagrees when religious freedom is at stake? Are we the church rich in history, yet grounded in the present and risking for the future?

Call it blinded by passion or emboldened by the long history of UU involvement in public education (see Horace Mann and John Dewey), I wouldn't have minded if we were to become known as the church that led the way on this issue; in an area rife with private religious schools, I suppose I think of the public schools as our schools. But my biases and my passions need not become yours.

So, what say we keep talking about how it is that this swell little church is to be known today and tomorrow? Let's keep working on our souls, supporting one another through trouble and just enjoying life together. But please keep thinking about the face of Nora Church in your corner of our "parish". For what would you like us to be known?

GROWTH ON THE PRAIIRIE

On Saturday, September 22, the Board and the Committee on Ministry met jointly with Lyn Burton (a UU church consultant) to look at the future of Nora and begin strategic planning for that future. We discussed a number of issues.

First we looked at the numbers; how many or how few in various age groups, what communities we live in, and other demographics. We looked at the positive and negative aspects of Nora, focusing on our mission.

After much discussion, we agreed that if we are to grow (or even survive) we must attract more people from the closest sizable population in the area, New Ulm.

As a result of our first joint meeting with Lyn, this proposition was put forward and unanimously approved: "We will meet again to formulate a plan and budget for a service in New Ulm as a means of growing the Nora Congregation."

There was also consensus around three features of a possible New Ulm presence: 1) Two Saturday evening services each month in New Ulm, 2) We would continue to take steps to grow from our present location, Nora Church, and, 3) The Board, COM and Don will seek congregational approval for any such plans.

Four years ago we decided to grow Nora by going back to full-time ministry. While a lot of good has come of that step, more is needed from us. Now it is time for that next step. Are there concerns with trying this? Yes, of course, but to do nothing would leave us at the mercy of too many factors we can't control: sparse population, decline of Hanska and the loss of its school, religiously conservative culture of much of the area, etc. If you have questions or concerns, please talk to me, other members of the Board or Committee on Ministry or Don.

One final item mentioned on Saturday was our awareness that we are the current stewards of Nora. Those before us worked to give us this wonderful place and it's our job to see that it is there for those in the future who have a need for our "Liberal Light on the Prairie."

As always, I'm looking for people to volunteer to teach Sunday School. Three people are needed

each weekend. The RE Committee is hoping that people will consider volunteering two Sundays (especially the first two Sundays) in a row to help with continuity for the children. If you teach two Sundays in a row, then you could take a month or two off from teaching and then teach another two Sundays a few months down the road. Of course, you may certainly volunteer for one Sunday too. Thank you for your generosity with your time and talents.

We are looking for more people to join the Youth RE Committee. We generally meet three to four times a year to plan Sunday School and other youth events throughout the year. Nora musicians Jordan and Muffy Rathman, Don Rollins and Rebecca Aadland will provide music while diners wait to be seated.


SMORG REMINDERS
