#### NORA CHURCH COMPLETES ENERGY AUDIT

In January 2008, Nora engaged the services of Alliant Energy to complete an energy audit on the church and parsonage. Several members of the social justice and building/ground committees completed the walk-through with the professional engineer.

What we're doing well:

- Rare use of air conditioning
- Unplugging many appliances when not in use
- Turning down heating thermostat during weekdays/outside of church events
- Turning off all lights when not in use (we use very little electricity)

The Alliant representative contractor said that the facility is managed very well and that any conservation practices should be continued.

Where we can improve:

- Add additional insulation to attic.
- Install high efficiency furnaces when the units need replacing
- Install high efficiency water heater when unit needs replacing
- Replace light bulbs in parsonage and church with compact fluorescent lights.

Replace single pane windows with double pane, low-E windows to reduce heat lost (as needed – savings will not be entirely sufficient to pay for windows replacement).

#### 2007-2008 ENERGY CHALLENGE

Carbon emissions are a key contributor to global warming issues. The Minnesota Energy Challenge website indicates that an average Minnesota family is responsible for the emission of over **50,000 pounds of carbon dioxide** per year. In the fall 2007, Nora members were invited to take an energy challenge pledge as one way for us to acknowledge our personal responsibility towards the environment. A key focus of Nora's social justice this year is environment issues and action and our goal has been to start with personal actions - moving towards greater engagement. During the February 10, 2008 service the social justice committee shared updates of the energy challenge with the congregation. Highlights of the Energy Challenge include:

13 Nora households representing 27 people took the energy challenge pledge Together, these households pledged to avoid over 45,000 pounds of carbon dioxide! Key actions included:

Replacing light bulbs with high efficiency compact fluorescent ones.

Using a programmable thermostat to lower the temperature in my home at least 5 degrees for at least 8 hours while away at work or asleep.

Setting air conditioning thermostat up 2 degrees.

Setting furnace thermostat down 2 degrees.

Washing clothes in cold water.

Installing a low flow showerhead.

Driving fewer miles/wk by combining trips, walking or biking.

Buying fewer plastic soda and water bottles

Buying eco-friendly cleaning products and packaging



Additionally, up to 3 households will be replacing cars this year with ones that gets 30 miles per gallon or more – this will avoid at least 9,000 pounds of CO2 in a year! If you are interested in joining the pledge, forms are located on the entryway table at Nora.

Did you know? If every household in the US replaced just one 25oz. bottle of petroleum-based dishwashing liquid with a plant based product, we could save 81,000 BARRELS OF OIL, enough to heat and cool 4,600 US homes for a year!

# **BOTTLED WATER**

In the 1990s, the first bottled water began to turn up in convenience stores & supermarkets. Originally no one gave much thought of negative consequences to a booming industry that today hits \$2.7 billion annual sales.

As the industry charged ahead with large corporations like Coke (Dasani – made from tap water) and Pepsi (Aquafina – also made from tap water) people began to see an impact. According to the organization Public Citizen, bottled water can ruin local watersheds, drain aquifers, and generate over 20 billion plastic bottles in landfills, annually. That isn't a typo – over **20 billion** plastic water bottles in landfills, each year.

As each of us sip our Evian, Fuji or another brand of bottled water, we impact access to safe drinking water everyone on our planet should have. More than 1 billion people worldwide currently have little or no access to safe drinking water.

Here are a few facts about bottled water:

- Close to 2 million tons of plastic was used to make bottles for water last year. That manufacturing involves an enormous amount of petroleum, since it is the key ingredient in plastic. In the U.S. alone, 30 million bottles a day get tossed out. Recycling them costs another small fortune in gasoline to haul them to plants.
- Bottled water is being promoted all over the world by companies that are staking their future on getting
  you to drink water from bottles since it is getting harder to persuade you to drink soda and other sugared
  water from their cans and its working.
- According to Beverage Marketing Corp., consumption of bottled water has doubled in the past decade.
   Americans now drink more water from bottles overall than any other nation.
- Be concerned about the quality of the water you are drinking. According to Rolf Halden of John Hopkins School of Public Health, "Bottled water can legally contain many things we would not tolerate in municipal drinking water."
- Halden also cautions about chemicals called phthalates that are sometimes added to plastics to make them less brittle. Phthalates, he says, "are environmental contaminants that can exhibit hormone-like behavior by acting as endocrine disruptors." If you heat up plastics, you could increase the leaching of phthalates from the containers into the water and food.

Consumers wanting to band the bottle can try the following:

- Refrigerate water in a large pitcher. If you don't have a water filter, let water sit in the pitcher overnight to let odors evaporate, then put in the fridge.
- Choose a water filter if taste or odor is a concern. Consumer Reports like the Pur faucet-mounted filter and the Sears countertop filter for removing common contaminants.
- Re-used commercial water bottles a few times after washing them in hot soapy water and air drying completely with the top off to kill bacteria. But you're better off using a durable, reusable sports water bottle that can be refilled many times.

Stop buying bottled water – it will help reduce global warming and cut down the earth's pollution burden. This will mean less oil for shipping the bottles, oil used for keeping the bottles cold, oil for the recycling process and the oil used originally to produce the bottles.


