VIEW FROM THE HILL

"They never know why we leave," she said. "True enough," I replied, "but often as not, neither do we." She nodded her head and we sat in silence.

That's a snippet from a conversation with a colleague – a conversation held a few years back and long before I submitted my resignation last month. We were reflecting on all the personal and professional factors that land us in and out of a given congregation, then acknowledging the reality that it's usually a "gut thing" on both counts. That was surely true in my decision to become your minister, and it's every bit as true as I leave.

It's true that leaving Nora is partly a career move, one calculated to help make up for serving relatively small congregations for relatively small pay. It's also true that I'm ready for a different set of challenges, mostly having to do with setting and size. But it's also a gut thing – a sense that both Nora and I would benefit from a change. In the end, it's not about money. It's not, thankfully, about conflict. It's about the gut sense that a change is in order.

As to the practical stuff, the Board has taken me up on my offer to provide emergency coverage (primarily serious illness and/or memorial services) until another minister (interim or settled) is chosen. In lieu of that minister, I'll be filling the pulpit of August 17 and 31, as well as September 14 and 28. (I'm in negotiations with our Bloomington congregation regarding "Smorg" Sunday, October 5.)

Please keep in mind that all of this will change should an interim or consulting minister be hired. Both common sense and ministerial guidelines require that my role at Nora end once she or he is on board.

Because it's possible that this may be my last column, let me tell you that I immediately liked you, the good folks of Nora. Because of my own wiring and "stuff", it took some time before I realized how much I love you. Thank you for returning that love in spades.

With the Board and Program Committee's permission, I'll be speaking on August 17 no matter the status of the interim/consulting search. I hope you can attend that or whichever service will be my last. If not, rich blessings on you. And thanks for all you do to keep Nora a vibrant voice for liberal religion.

MIDWEST FLOOD RELIEF You Can Help Fellow UUs

Flooding this summer has caused devastation in the Midwest. UU congregations in Iowa, Indiana, and Wisconsin have been affected. In Prairie Star, there are 15 UU households in Iowa City with homes damaged or destroyed by the flooding. We don't yet know how the financial impact of the floods will affect the jobs and lives of Unitarian Universalists in other Iowa communities.

A Chosen Faith: Self-Study Guide (On-going)

A guided examination of Unitarian Universalism, based on the book *A Chosen Faith* by John Buehrens and Forrest Church. Adapted to this online format by Jone Johnson Lewis from a study guide by Joan Goodwin. Full participation in this course requires having the book *A Chosen Faith*, available from the UUA bookstore at www.uua.org/bookstore. *Free*

New UU: Self-Study Guide (On-going)

A program for new Unitarian Universalists. You can move through the sessions at your own pace. For each session there are readings, and various questions to discuss in a forum. All readings are available on-line. *Free*

The Gospel According to Harvey Taught by David Dawson: Aug. 4, 2008 — Sep. 1, 2008

This four-week class will use the 1950 film version of Mary Chase's Pulitizer Prize-winning play, "Harvey," to explore questions familiar to all UUs. This classic film about an eccentric "everyman" who happens to befriend an invisible, 6-foot 3-and-a-half-inch white rabbit was never considered frivolous when it was released. Hilarious, yes. Frivolous, no. Today, the questions that it raises are just as valid, if not more so: How do we maintain our beliefs as free-thinking individuals in a culture of conformity? Are we truly tolerant of individuals who are profoundly different from us, or do we find ourselves trying to change them to fit our ideas of normality? Each week we will look at different facets of UU theology through the lens of this film. \$40

The Soul of Nature: A Journey into the Poetry of Mary Oliver

Taught by the Rev. Amanda Aikman: Sep. 8, 2008 — Oct. 20, 2008

Mary Oliver has been lovingly called "the poet laureate of Unitarian Universalism." Through keen observation of the natural world, Oliver finds delight, sorrow, mystery and paradox. In this six-session class, we will find a safe container for our reflections on the spiritual and personal meanings of Oliver's poems, using her themes as pathways into a spiritual practice of close observation of nature. There will be optional weekly writing exercises for those who wish to try their hand at poetry. The class will be based on Oliver's "New and Selected Poems, Volume 2," which is widely available. \$40

A UU Approach to the Bible

Taught by John Nichols: Oct. 13, 2008 — Dec. 8, 2008
The Fundamentalist insistence that the Bible is to be read literally is fairly recent. Those who wrote the scriptures knew they were writing stories in metaphorical language to illuminate our encounter with the inescapable issues of living and with the sacred. Read as they should be, Biblical passages reveal their meaning and power for everyone, including people of many religious backgrounds. This course will allow participants to try a new way of looking at familiar passages, a way that is fully compatible with Unitarian Universalism. \$40

Religion and Ecology: A Shared Fate, A Shared Task Taught by Peg Shaffer: Jan. 12, 2009 – Feb. 20, 2009

How are the world's religions responding to environmental concerns? Is the environment a religious issue? John Henry Newman has stated that people will die for a dogma who will not stir for a conclusion. What if, then, environmentalism was discussed in religious rather than scientific language? Would the 2/3 of the world's population who belong to a religion then pay more attention, be willing to make changes? In this course we'll explore the spiritual aspects of the environmental crisis and how the world's religions are working separately and together toward sav-

ing this sacred space called Earth, from the Hindu concept of ahimsa (do no harm) and the ethics of Buddhism, to the shareable wisdom of Islam, from the Protestant work ethic, Thoreau's Walden, the ruach or "breath" of Judaism, to the Mennonite philosophy of living more with less. We'll look at the resources that these religions bring to the discussion of what is being called "deep ecology." the religious and ethical dimensions of viewing the earth as sacred.

SHAMANIC EXPERIENCE RETREAT

Jenny Ray, an elder of the Santee Dakota Sioux Tribe, Shaman and Medicine woman will be leading this three-day workshop. We will gather in an ancient forest to become ceremony together and learn the art of drum making, go on an insightful Shamanic journey and make a smudge fan.

Jenny Ray is a Native American Medicine woman, Shaman, author and educator who has studied under numerous native American Medicine People and Shamans from a variety of backgrounds. Jenny has been a Medicine woman for over 20 years, while pouring "Inipi" (Sweat Lodge) ceremony for nearly 30 years. Completion of studies in the Shamanic arts and ceremonies held with Shaman, Phil Morgan, allow her to carry the title of Shaman. She is known as Ska Mato Pejuta Winan (White Bear Medicine Woman), a name given to her by her late father, well known Dakota Elder Chas Thompson.

Dear Friend of Prairie Star District, As we all enjoy these wonderful days of summer, I want to thank you again for your generosity to Friends of Prairie Star District and to tell you about some of the exciting things going on, made possible, in part, with your gift.

Based on the enthusiastic responses to our first-ever online workshop last fall, we're expanding our use of technology this fall. In collaboration with two other districts, we have scheduled a series of four monthly workshops, each offered twice. between August and November. These will include "10 Good Ideas about Getting Your Church Ready for the Fall," 10 Good Ideas about Effective Leadership in Meetings," "...about Multigenerational Worship," and "...about Adding a Service." The workshops will cover the basics and will also include information about how to access additional resources after the workshop ends. In August of 2009, we'll se 200 or more UU's of all ages gathering at a camp near Ashland, Nebraska, for five days of fun, multigenerational celebration, and meaningful conversation.

In addition, we will offer expanded Fall leadership workshops in Des Moines and in the Twin Cities, two Radical Hospitality workshops in Duluth and in Davenport, and more. 
