A VIEW FROM THE HILL

I almost missed it.

In my typical pay-no-attention-to-the-commercials fashion I was walked out of the room when the tag-line for a car company flashed across the screen and caught my eye. "Joy is futureproof."

Just days earlier I had told the Nora Church Board of Trustees that I believe my mission in ministry here is to walk with you as you discover--or perhaps remember--your joy. Not your individual joys, though of course those are precious, but your collective joy as a congregation.

So I got pretty excited when I saw that tagline. "Yeah! That's it!" I thought. "That's why we should concentrate on joy. Because it's future proof. If Nora finds its joy the next 130 years will take care of themselves!" Thanks to BMW I'd be able to communicate my vision with no effort or further thought and development at all.

I told the board, our mission in ministry, as you approach 130 years of existence, is to move into that junction of gladness and hunger, to occupy it mindfully, and to serve the world from it. If we can do that, the future will take care of itself.

Richard S. Gilbert retired in June 2005 after

ministry in Cleveland, Ohio, Golden, Colorado, Ithaca, NY, and for 32 years at the First Unitarian Church of Rochester, NY. He received an M.Div. from St. Lawrence University Theological School, a D. Min. from Colgate Rochester Divinity School and an honorary doctorate from Starr King School for the Ministry. He is the author of the Building Your Own Theology adult religious education series, as well as three Skinner House Books: The Prophetic Imperative: Social Gospel in Theory and Practice, How Much Do We Deserve? An Inquiry in Distributive Justice and In the Holy Quiet of This Hour, a book of meditations. Currently he is part-time Social Justice Coordinator for the St. Lawrence Unitarian Universalist District, does guest preaching, social justice workshops and is working on several books including the religious life of Susan B. Anthony and the history and philosophy of UU religious education.

His workshop will be on economic justice with a focus on lowa and the Midwest. Those interested in working on the lowa Social Justice Network will have dinner with Reverend Gilbert at 6 PM Saturday night.

On April 11, 2010, Reverend Gilbert will also lead the Adult Forum at 9:45 AM, and preach on Sunday at 11 AM at Peoples Church.

UPDATE FROM KRISZTINA

It cannot believe that it past almost one year after my accident. It pasted so fast. The time simply slid away.

It happened a lot from 10th of March.

I had surgeries, I stayed in bed 2.5 month, I cried a lot, and my family cried a lot and my friends too. FRIENDS!!! It has to happen this accident to realize how many friends I have, who stayed near me in bad situations, encouraging me in hard times. Staying in bed I had time to be more and more with my family. I realized that they are the best!!! After 3 month I began to learn walking. With hard work, exercises, what I have now, too I can walk now without any helpers, any sticks. I tried to dance, too. The problem is, that I cannot wear shoes with heels. Before, I had worn elegant clothes. Now I became sporty girl. I still cannot get dressed alone, wash my right foot etc, I still cannot sit and walk in normal position. That's why I have pains on my back, not just on my leg.

But I try to be independent as I was before the accident. I tried to drive, but it is not too easy, so I gave it up for awhile...But I didn't give up with work.

I have begun to work, to write projects, grants for my community and for the school. I earned them, now I am on way to implement these grants. I wrote a book with title: Fruits in Salt Valley and its methods of using. The English version of our Community newsletter appears every month in our Partner Church from USA. The newsletter is created, translated by me. I got ISSN (International Standard Serial Number) for my 2 newsletter created by me: community newsletter and school newsletter. I finished another faculty in Bucharest. Now I am preparing for another exam. And the most important I celebrated my 30th birthday on New Years Eve. Almost every day I swim, I make special exercises, too. On 15th of March I will go to Portugal with a grant earned by me. Returning home I will have another 2 surgeries. Every day I am thinking on it. It appears fears when I am thinking on it . But I know that after it will be better. I hope so.

A good thing is that I am a real, alive meteo system. I can predict the weather.

The most important is to be optimist even when you have pains, troubles. We have a saying: after rain sunshine comes ...

I would like to thank you again who is thinking of me and praying for me. And again THANK you for all persons who make my dreams real, exactly that I could visit USA. Because it was one year ago...And I never forget it!!! The memories appear almost every day, especially when I am watching a movie from USA, places where I was. I am so glad that I was there and I hope that there will be again possibility to go again.

I send 2 pictures with me and 30 flowers and with my boyfriend.

WHY ST. PATRICK'S DAY IS CELEBRATED EACH YEAR IN AMERICA

Secretly, he organized the Irish IRATRION (Irish Republican Army to Rid Ireland of Norwegians)


