As compromises go this has been a good one. I've been both professionally challenged and personally content. And in a series of cottage meetings last fall you indicated your desire for our ministry together to continue. Which brings us to this spring's candidating week.

An article elsewhere in this newsletter provides a schedule of events for the week along with an excellent explanation of the purpose behind our candidate week. I'm aware that some of you are wondering why we are engaging in what seems a mere formality. The way I see it, we can view this week as a hoop to be jumped through or as an opportunity to set the stage for a long and fruitful ministry. Since we have already had a significant amount of time together, joys and sorrows and lots of ordinary times in between, candidate week is our chance to look toward to the future.

Please read the candidating week article carefully and put the events on your calendar. If we're to find that pot of gold on April 3, we'll need everyone to follow the rainbow--forthright in airing concerns and bold in envisioning a vibrant future for Nora Church. I look forward to our adventure together.

And, as long as we are improving communication, if your newsletter e-mail isn't reaching the address you prefer, please send updated information to the same address.


GUEST ON MARCH 20TH

SAVE THE DATES!! A TIME FOR VOWS

In the process of calling a settled minister candidating week is often described as a "courtship". It is usually the first meet-up between an interested minister and a congregation. All participants put their best faces on. They hope to "wow" each other during a carefully designed selection process. The church wants the minister to see energetic, committed members, a welcoming physical setting, an intriguing surrounding community to live in, an opportunity for spiritual growth. The minister hopes the congregation will see a warm and caring disposition, intellectual capacity, strong communication, inspiring leadership. As Nora Church prepares for candidating week we find ourselves in a different place than "courting". Lisa already has a good picture of our talents and flaws, the ebb and flow of our energies, our history and concern for the future. We aren't in a position of "wowing" each other, so are we ready for the vows?

What does candidating mean for us? The obvious is that on April 3 there will be a congregational meeting to take official action to call a settled minister. We have had the good fortune of getting to know Lisa for eighteen months. We've taken steps to prepare for candidating. We did a paper/pencil survey at the end of the first year together. It gave us the chance to see if any big or little issues lay unspoken. Growth, religious ed, and outreach to shut-ins were brought up as areas of concern. Cottage meetings were held last fall. Members in face to face dialogue shared their ideas, hopes and dreams for church life. Increasing financial concerns became apparent. We know the future for rural churches is precarious. During the eighteen months that Lisa has been here, she has already shown us what she has to offer. We know her preaching abilities, her intellectual capacity, her communication style, her relationship building skills. We have two upcoming opportunities to just be together, to enjoy each others company, share a story, tell an old joke, have a laugh. There will be circle get-togethers in small groups Mar. 11 –13 and an evening for card playing and board games for all ages at the end of the month.

One of the cherished traditions of the UUA is the freedom congregations have in calling their minister. This freedom gives us choice and a responsibility to act with intentionality. We do not get to this step by chance or accident but by demonstrating that we honor and care for the relationship between minister and congregation. As we approach candidating week we have the unusual opportunity to go deeper in our relationship with Lisa. It's not the getting to know you dance that we are stepping through. This is our opportunity to acknowledge the strengths and the talents as well as the flaws and the blemishes and decide how we can build a future together. Now, together with Lisa, we can say "This is how I see it. This is what I bring to the relationship. This is where we can go together."

Candidating week will have events scheduled for particular focus areas. Please see the schedule posted in this newsletter. We will talk about the specifics of finances, budgets and pledges, about membership and program and R. E. Lisa will share views from her perspective. We will share our views. We will come together to be honest, direct, forthright and loving. We will come together to secure as best we can the future of Nora Church. Save the dates, mark your calendars, and let's see if we're ready for the vows.
