And this is one of those years. Leap-day babies the world around will be turning a year older for the first time since 2008. And we all get an extra day. What will you do with yours?

In her popular poem The Summer Day Mary Oliver asks, Doesn't everything die at last, and too soon?/Tell me, what is it you plan to do/with your one wild and precious life?

It is a good question and there are many potential benefits to planning, but a life is (usually) a huge chunk of time. Rather than wait until we are forced to install a new one we have gotten a few estimates to dig a new one and cap the old one. We are also looking to some cost sharing possibilities as well. Further updates on this will follow.

We have set a congregational meeting for February 19th to elect trustees for the board. As with any board I have been on we are always looking at our budget and finances each month. I feel we are comfortable, but just like my personal finances we have to watch the bottom line.

We have had such an easy winter so far, I for one am liking it. For those who like the winter sports that require snow, take heart in knowing we will again have winters like the past two.

WATER TESTING

The Minnesota Department of Health has tested the water at Nora Church for a number of years, since we are a public water supply. The samples always passed until this year when we have failed due to contamination from surface bacteria. To try to correct this Warren Paulson bleached the well and flushed the lines after which we would pass but fail again on a retest. We have repeated this scenario a number of times this past year. At present we are bringing in water for drinking in both the parsonage and the church. Personnel from the Department of Health have recommended digging a new well.

The well and pressure tank that we are using at present is located in the pump house on the south edge of the property. No one remembers exactly but Wally Wellman was in LRY when our present well using a metal casing was dug inside an older shallow cement tile well. The water line then runs into the parsonage basement where it is softened and sent to the social hall. There is another older unused well and pump inside the cement structure near the parsonage.

The sources of contamination could be from the surface and the older wells not having been capped properly. It is also possible that life of the metal casing is used up, is rusted through and is being contaminated by surface water entering at those points.

The congregation will be asked to make the decision about digging a new well. It is possible to apply for a grant from the Department of Health in April that would pay for ½ the cost of a new well, including installation and equipment. The two older wells would then be sealed. A new well could be located near the parsonage where the pressure tank would be located and sent to the social hall with new pipe.

We have solicited two bids for the project with Searles Well Drilling submitting the lowest bid of over \$9,000. This is a large amount of money and the congregation will be asked whether to do this project. If we do move ahead we will be requesting contributions above regular pledges and not dip into reserves more than necessary. Warren Paulson has been most involved and will be happy to answer questions.

A message from Nora RE- We have been moving along The Seven principles at what seems the speed of light! Each month we have three lessons in each principle.

In November we focused on the Third Principle, Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregation. In RE we translate this to mean that we should accept one another and keep on learning together. We learned to meditate, we gave thanks for the opportunity to grow spiritually and had fun and meaningful lessons on acceptance of all others and their differences. We discussed the life of Theodore Parker and learned about peaceful means to bring about growth in ourselves and others. We also wrote letters to the Sunday school participants in our sister church in Benced, Transylvania. We hope to continue our friendship with their RE as well.

In December we learned about the Fourth Principle, a free and responsible search for truth and meaning that each person must be free to search for what is true and right in life. We discovered the life lessons of Helen Keller. We learned to teach each other skills through the game of charades. We discovered secular thoughts on creation through the story of Charles Darwin as well as explored briefly the biblical stories of Genesis. We also focused on a few of the teachings of Jesus, and his life as a teacher. We learned about Maria Mitchell, another famous Unitarian who was the first woman astronomer and college professor in astronomy.

In January we have been exploring the 5th Principle, the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large. This translates to: we believe that all people should have a vote about the things that concern them. We are discovering the different types of government through games and stories.

Our Brementown musicians discovered that while they were so very different, their voices blended so beautifully and they were able to make decisions as a group using collective consensus.

We will be learning about our rights as citizens and our role in the democratic process as well as protecting this right for everyone as a basic human right and the role of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in securing those rights for all of us.

We received special gifts made by the RE at our sister church in Benced. Look on the wall by the stairs to see the pretty Christmas decorations they made to share with us!

February will be an exciting month! The Sixth Principle is the goal of world community and peace, liberty and justice for all. This translates to we believe in working for a peaceful, fair and free world. We will discover why we should work towards this goal and towards achieving basic human rights.


Did You Know?




