### VIEW FROM THE HILL



The Unitarian Universalist church in which I grew up used to (and still does) have a carol shout on the Sunday before Christmas each year. A carol shout is like a hymn

sing, except the only hymns sung are Christmas carols and anyone wishing to sing a particular carol next must shout his/her choice above the din of a few hundred other voices shouting out the number of their favorite carol.

I always shouted # 292. These days I'd be shouting # 242. Either way it would be the same carol. In the Lonely Midnight, a fairly obscure carol, evidently, but also my favorite for almost as long as I can remember. # 292 was rarely chosen during the carol shout. Silent Night was the perennial favorite. So was Watchmen, Tell Us of the Night because everyone knew that was the minister's favorite, and other traditional, familiar carols: O Come, All Ye Faithful, O Little Town of Bethlehem. and It Came Upon the Midnight Clear. One year when I was disappointed yet again that we didn't sing In the Lonely Midnight during the carol shout my mood shifted abruptly after the short sermon when the minister announced that our closing carol would be # 292.

One other detail I remember about those annual, raucous carol shouts: the minister always said, as he closed the shouting/singing period of the service, "Remember, if we didn't sing your favorite carol here this morning, there are still lots of days of Christmas left. You can sing your favorite carol in the car on the way home. Or if you go Christmas caroling in your neighborhood. Or to yourself just before falling asleep."

That's the thing about Christmas, and Hanukkah, and Solstice, and New Year's and just about every holiday. There are dozens of songs to be sung. Hundreds of special holiday treats to be savored. Scores of television specials and community concerts: the Nutcracker Suite, Amal and the Night Visitors, the Black Nativity, a Charlie Brown Christmas Special, Rudolph's Rocking New Year's Eve. Myriad decorating options-star or angel atop the tree; homemade Menorah or fancy heirloom; theme tree or mis-mash; flashing lights or steady.

Sometimes families can't agree on the ones they will sing, bake, eat, watch, string on tree. And sometimes they can agree but just can't fit them all in. Choices have to be made, even during December. Some things will be left off the party menu or the Christmas Day schedule of events. Compromises will be reached. Disappointments are inevitable.

But remember, the traditional twelve days of Christmas START on December 25 and last until January 6. And the contemporary winter holiday season of Christmas, Yule, Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, seems to begin around Thanksgiving and last until school starts up again right after January 1. And some where in that span of weeks, there is time for you to sing your favorite carol. Make or nibble your favorite treat. Read your favorite seasonal story. Switch the tree top star for an angel, even if only for an hour or two when you are the only one home to enjoy it. You have the power to make the holiday one that will feed


