# A View From the Hill

A new roof is going up on the parsonage as I write. We put 30 year shingles on the church a couple years ago. The Building and Grounds Committee, board, and congregation of the future will have several more years breathing room between the next roof jobs.

I'm grateful, on behalf of those future church members and leaders, for the vision of our current leaders, for the responsible way they maintain our buildings and property, and for their foresight in providing for the spacing out of major investments next time around. Larry and Vickie Bakken send word that Larry's lymphoma has returned. He is receiving outpatient treatment. Larry was in the clinic on Thursday Oct. 22, for Bendamustine and Rituxan, on Friday, Oct 23 for Bendamustine and on Monday, Oct 26 for a Neulasta shot to help grow the white blood cells.

He appears to have no reactions to this chemo combination at least for this time. They gave him some steroids so he had a flushed face on Friday morning but nothing to worry about and it went away quickly.


He put the first chemo off one week so it would not interfere with his deer hunting Nov. 6-15.

He remains positive that he can beat the lymphoma again this time and send it back into remission. He will have lab tests on the next 3 Thursdays to see how his blood counts are. If his blood counts are OK, the next chemo treatment will be Nov 19. He is looking forward to baby boy Bakken (Justin and Molly) arriving about the same time.

It is the deep well we cannot know until precisely the moment we dig down and find at the root of it all something to hold, something we didn't buy or make or practice. But there it is. There is mystery in resilience."
