A View From the Hill

They looked like people you see on the six o'clock news—refugees, sent to wait in some strange ugly place, with all their boxes and sacks around them...It suddenly occurred to me that this was just the way it must have been for the real Holy Family, stuck away in a barn by people who didn't care much what happened to them.*

*The night when she first gave birth/Had been cold. But in later years/She quite forgot.***

The men were old/how could they know/of a mother's needs/or a child's appetite?/But as they kneeled/the child was fed.***

I recently watched the first two seasons of *The Americans*—Fox's series about Phillip and Elizabeth Jennings, deep cover agents raising their family and spying for the Soviet union in Fall's Church, Virginia in the 1980s, at the tail end of the Cold War. In the second season their teenager Paige joins a Christian youth group and becomes enamored of and active in the social justice ministry of the church. Elizabeth is proud of her daughter's passion for making the world a better place but dismayed to the point of fury that that passion is fueled by a fantasy of supernatural, fairytale superheroes, instead of real, flesh and blood human (Communist) heroes.

Now, I love a good spy story. And I feel for Elizabeth—torn between her parental pride and her deeply held ideology—but she's got it all wrong. When Paige protests a military base and the youth pastor is arrested for chaining himself to the gate, that Jesus-centered passion for justice is all about real, flesh and blood humanity. The flesh and blood humanity they want to save from nuclear warheads (again, 1980s), and the flesh and blood human, Jesus, whose teaching inspired them.

I tell the story of the Nativity on Christmas Eve because it is Christmas Eve. And I read the story from the Christian Scriptures because it is Christmas Eve. And I read the pieces excerpted at the top of this column (and others like them) because it is Christmas Eve—the time we, as Unitarian Universalists, celebrate the birth of a *human baby to human parents*.

This season is a festival of fantasy, fairy-tales, legends, songs, poetry and stories, celebrating miracles from the return of light to the birth of a savior in the most unlikely of places and forms. And the core is neither supernatural nor other-than-human. The season revolves around the miracle of the flesh and blood and spirit human capacity for bringing peace and joy, and the miracle of the creation's own renewal of light, year after year despite all human fear and disbelief.

Come to church this season. Bring your family, friends and neighbors. Tell them (and yourselves) that here you can sing the songs of the season, hear the stories of the season, with all your desire for miracles, all your faith in science, all your longing to believe in human goodness. None of it at odd with any of the rest of it. All of it holy.

Board Meeting

The next Nora Board meeting will be on Sunday, December 13th after church.

Keeping the Roof Over Our (or in this case, Lisa's) Head

As many of you are aware, earlier this year, the Board, in consultation with the Building and Grounds committee, decided to re-roof the parsonage. There were damaged and missing shingles and the remaining shingles were at the end of their 20/30 year life. In the course of re-roofing, damage to the roof decking and the balcony railing was discovered, necessitating the replacement of the damaged areas. This increased the cost from approximately \$12,000 to just over \$16,000. The Board had cashed in a CD (\$12,043.67), but with the increase in the cost, this is not sufficient to cover the expense. Therefore, I come to you with a request for money. \$5000 will cover the cost of the repairs and the 50 year-life shingles which were installed, with a minimal surplus, which will go into the General Fund.

Those of you who carefully observe the figures published in the newsletter each month and the order of service each Sunday will know that our expenses (while modest to the point of frugality) often outpace our income. Please be assured that our Board members take their fiduciary responsibility to the congregation seriously and are in regular conversation with the minister about meeting Nora's long- and short-term financial needs. You will hear more about those discussions and any proposals that may emerge from them, from the pulpit, in the newsletter and at congregational meetings as the church year progresses.

To contribute, simply make out a check to Nora and write "Roof" in the memo area. Thank you for your continued generosity as we work to keep our beloved. church and parsonage in working order.

A Note From the Treasurer

October Income and Expenses

Income: \$5,868.83

Funds Transfer: \$12,043.67 (financing parsonage roofing)

Expenses \$12,326.48 (\$7,000 towards roofing)

The total cost of the parsonage roofing came to \$16,217.00 - more than \$4,000 over the initial bid due to the need to replace siding, roof decking and new railings.

A letter from Lisa

Almost six and a half years!

I arrived at Nora Church in August 2009, as your consulting minister. Two years later you installed me as settled minister. As part of our negotiations at that time the Board agreed to allow me to include those first two years in the accrual of years toward a sabbatical. So the time has come, here in our seventh year together, for me to embark on sabbatical.

I'm due six months away from ministerial duties for rest and renewal. I've decided for a variety of reasons to split my sabbatical into two chunks. I will be away from Nora (and the parsonage) from January 1, 2016 to February 29, 2016. I will take the remaining four months of sabbatical in early 2017.

• The program committee (Christopher Olson, Nita Gilbert and Karen Farrell) has been busy scheduling a line-up of great speakers to fill the pulpit for eight Sundays (there's no service the first Sunday in January). You'll hear Unitarian Universalist ministers as well as ministers and lay-people from other faith traditions.

• The Board is working on a plan to ensure that the parsonage is looked after in my absence.

- If necessary, congregation president Karen Farrell, in consultation with the scheduled speaker, will make the decision regarding weather cancellations.
- Brooke will continue to work five hours a week, generally Tuesdays and Friday.

I'm making arrangements for pastoral care coverage from Unitarian Universalist colleagues. Information on the procedure for accessing pastoral care will be provide in the January newsletter.

I will spend January and February in an apartment in Minneapolis, working on writing projects, deepening my spiritual practice, and enjoying the cultural life of Minneapolis and St. Paul. I anticipate returning to Nora rested, inspired, and oh so grateful for your generosity in granting me this time away from ministerial duties.
