View from the Hill

As the summer ends, my husband Michael and I just returned from a month-long camping trip. We visited Montana, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, and on our way back, Wyoming. Our first night in Bismarck, ND the smoke from Canadian wildfires was so awful that we almost turned around and went home. We consulted the US smoke maps on our phones looking for a route West through the fires that were also burning in WA, OR and MT.

We found a clear spot on the map, which happened to be Red Lodge, MT and headed there. We were lucky to get a beautiful campsite in a Forest Service campground a few miles out of town and hiked there in clear blue skies until the smoke cleared in Glacier. But we had missed some of our long-ago reserved sites in Glacier so instead, we had to move to a different sight each night. But it was worth it; we saw moose, ptarmigan, marmots, clear alpine lakes and beauty everywhere. And huckleberries were ripe we cooked fresh huckleberry pancakes every morning.

In Northern Idaho we camped and kayaked on the 40 mile Lake Pend Oreille. On Whidbey Island, off the coast of Seattle, my oldest sister took us walking on the beaches at low tide where we saw red starfish and bright green see anemones. The locals make massive sculptures and little beach shelters out of the driftwood that washes ashore. In Central WA, I visited another sister of mine on her little farm and we picked mountains of blackberries and green beans. We welcomed the cool mornings in her hot tub as the sun came up over the mountains.

I'm glad that we didn't turn back at Bismarck. Sometimes turning back is the right thing to do, but this time, we found our way by staying very flexible. As a person who likes all my ducks in a row, it was good spiritual practice. The reward was beautiful mountain and beach hikes, cooking meals with farm fresh produce and family, and lots of laughter.


